Dear Chief Justice George:

I am an academic geriatric psychiatrist who does a fair amount of expert consultation and testimony in the area of civil competency and susceptibility to undue influence. In the course of this work I evaluate elderly, intellectually impaired individuals who are at risk for, or are actually suffering fiduciary and sometimes physical abuse at the hands of caregivers, friends, and occasionally relatives. For many of these victims the services of a competent elder law attorney is all that stands between them and financial ruin or worse. In the 21 years that I have been working in this area I have been impressed by the idealism, commitment, and dedication demonstrated by the attorneys that I've consulted and testified for, and by the gratifying outcomes of their interventions. I fear that the unintended consequence of the Levitt decision will be to deprive many elderly victims of abuse of any hope of competent legal assistance, and I urge you to review this decision before avoidable but irreparable harm is done.
